On Montana's Flathead Lake, Stone Quarry Bay and Point House represent the commitment of environmentalists to the rich aesthetic and ecology of a wild landscape. The pavilion is inserted into a stone ridge line, extending into a cattail marsh. Site grades submerge the building and paths in restored rock formations and the Ponderosa Pine forest. The stone work is deeply rooted in the land as grass-grown graveled roads and trails slip quietly into the land. Native plants selectively add to the natural elegant and minimalist character of the site. The design intentionally subordinates the human touch to that of nature, posing the question "To which extent is this art and to which restoration?"
